The Uigwe is a massive collection of 3,895 books composed with detailed illustrations and texts of various royal ceremonies and rituals such as weddings, coronations, funerals, and even architectural paintings of the palaces and the city.

The six ceremonial events known as the "six rites" (yungnye) include the royal proposal (napchae), the acceptance of the proposal (napjing), the announcement of the wedding date (gogi), the investiture of the queen or the crown princess (chaekbi or chaekbin), the royal groom's visit to the detached palace to meet the bride and bring her to the palace (chinyeong), and the formal wedding ceremony (dongroe-yeon).

It is known as eoyeo meori(어여머리), also called as 'the royal hairstyle' because only women of the court can use this one. Tteoljam(테올잠), the two round-shaped ornaments with fluttering metal flowers and butterflies are used for this kind of hairstyle alongside other large and small hairpins.

Women in the royal court throughout Joseon times (1392-1910), such as queens, royal concubines and court ladies, were given ranks called naemyeongbu (나emyeong부, 나emyeong부). The queen led all the women and they lived according to a strict order of ranks and rules. The rules of the royal family governed their lives in all aspects, such as where they lived, what they ate and what they wore.

Joseon was the last dynasty of Korea and its longest-ruling Confucian dynasty. During its reign, Joseon encouraged the entrenchment of Chinese Confucian ideals and doctrines in Korean society. Neo-Confucianism was installed as the new dynasty's state ideology. Buddhism was accordingly discouraged and occasionally faced persecutions by the dynasty.
